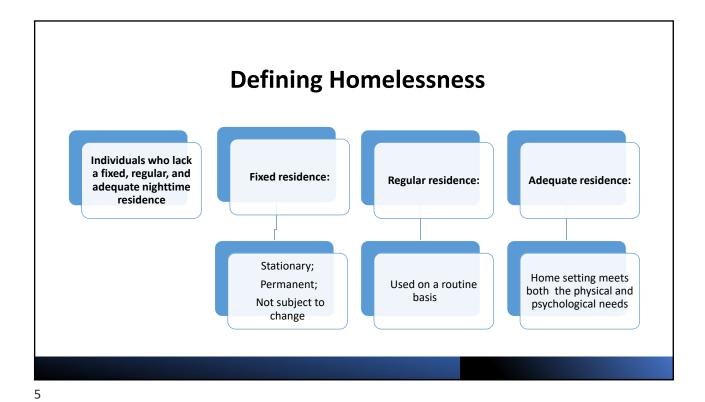

A federal law designed to increase the school enrollment, attendance, and success of children and youth who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence.

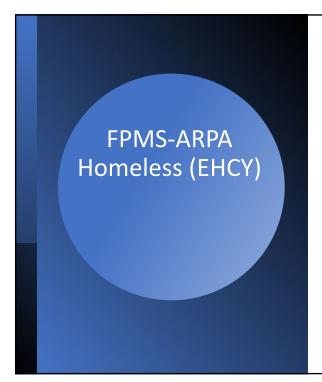

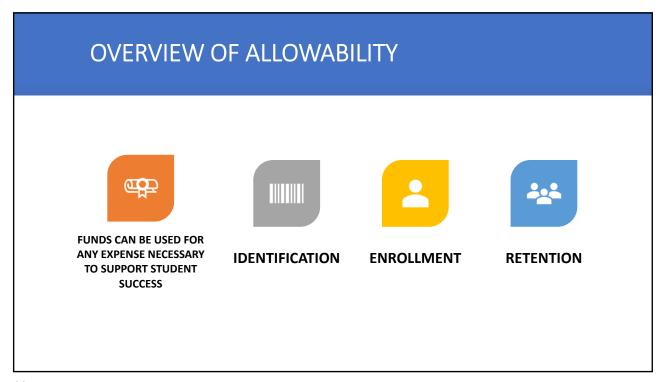

Wraparound services (through contracts with community-based organizations, and could include academic supports, trauma-informed care, social-emotional support and mental health services)

Store cards or prepaid debit cards to purchase necessities for school activities and telephone minutes

Professional development designed to heighten the understanding of the needs of homeless children and youth and their rights

Services to attract, engage and retain students experiencing homelessness

Education and training for families about their rights and available resources

Coordination between schools and agencies providing services

Needed supplies related to COVID-19

Short-term, temporary housing during emergencies or to enable full participation in school activities

Referral services for medical, dental, mental and other health services

REFLECT

Reflect on the challenges that your homeless program faced during the COVID-19 pandemic around identification, transportation, housing, delivery of resources and services, school/extracurricular attendance, etc.

REVIEW

Review data of your program for the last three years, including homeless students academic performance, graduation rates, attendance, discipline, participation rate in extracurricular activities, special populations, etc.

DENTIFY

- Identify your stakeholders and seek input from them in serving students impacted by the pandemic and experiencing homelessness
- identify supplemental educational programs and services needed
- Identify supplemental wrap-around services and supports needed
- Identify the educational, social, emotional, and/or mental health needs of homeless students

UPDATE

Update your homeless education program needs assessment that includes information you learned in your reflection, review, and identification of needs. Also include challenges, new data, stakeholders, needs, and plans

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FISICAL CONSIDERATIONS

PSUs must ensure that all costs associated with ARPA Homeless (EHCY) funding are:
